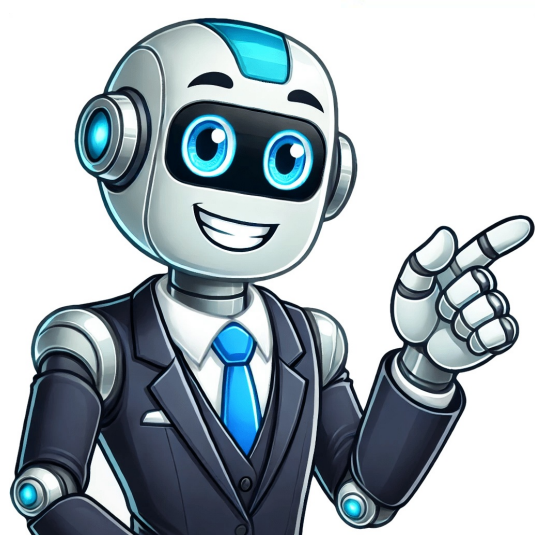

3DA UK National Series - Style & Class Rules 2020 GENERAL RULES FOR 3DA UK NATIONAL SERIES PRO/AM EVENTS AND COMPETITIONS: Shooting Styles, Class Definitions, Age Restrictions and Rules: "Styles" refers to the type of equipment you plan to shoot. "Class" refers to level at which you intend to compete, ie Professional or Amateur. Other restrictions include Known or Unknown Distance Competitions. There will be a Male and Female section for every style. Shooting Styles: Open Style: May use any compound bow with stabilisers, arrow rest, peep sight, sight and scope (which must NOT project an image onto the target), release aid (NOT electronic). Other permitted accessories include Lights on Scopes Pins and Spirit Levels. Olympic Recurve: Limited to recurve bows with non-magnified sights, clickers, stabilisers, finger tabs, pressure buttons, arrow rests. No Spirit Levels allowed. Fixed Pin Style: May use any compound bow with fixed pins sight or movable sights that are locked down into a fixed position. Magnification is permitted along with release aids and various accessories like clarifiers, verifiers, peep lights and spirit levels. Barebow Compound: A compound bow with no sight must be shot off the fingers (Release Aids not allowed). Allowed stabilizers and accessories include clickers and draw checks. Barebow Recurve: Similar to Barebow Compound but for recurve bows. Permitted accessories include front stabilizers and clickers. Bowhunter Style: The Bow can be Recurve, Flatbow or Longbow of Historical design without wheels or cams. Release aid, sights and draw checks not allowed. Allowed is one Front Stabiliser under 12", Plunger buttons, arrow must shot off the shelf or arrow rest. Traditional Style: Traditional bows have specific rules regarding bow types and arrow specifications like material (Carbon, Aluminium or Wood), fletch type (Plastic or Feather) and identical size, weight and construction. Given article text here The rules for each type of archery are as follows: Wooden construction is required without wheels or cams, release aid, sights, stabilisers and draw checks are not permitted. Arrows must be shot off the hand or shelf with a consistent anchor point on draw. All arrows must be wooden with a Feather Fletch and identical in size weight and construction. In historical archery, the bow must be predominantly made of wood based on English Longbow design, with no wheels or cams. Release aid, sights stabilisers and draw checks are not permitted. Arrows must be shot off the hand without arrow rests or plunger buttons. All arrows must be wooden with a Feather Fletch and identical in size weight and construction. Crossbows must comply with manufacturer specifications. Scopes up to 6x power may be used, but no light image projection is allowed. Crossbows can only be shot while standing and devices that relieve bow weight from arms are not permitted. Bolts must be of equal size weight with a minimum of three vanes. Crossbows can only be cocked and loaded while standing at the stake, and while loaded must remain pointed down range. In NASP archery, barebow is used without sights stabilizers release aids but one consistent anchor point finger position on the string. NASP styles may not be available at every event please check official website for further information. Junior archers are under 16 years old require adult supervision all classes regardless of style. Juniors may compete in adult classes when appropriate still need adult supervision not 3DA responsibility for supervision safety and well-being We are Ashcombe Valley Archers, a NFAS field archery club based in Devon on the Eastern coast, overlooking Dawlish and Teignmouth. Founded in 1992, we cater for all styles of shooting using long bows, recurve, or compound bows at our 36 target course set in fields and woods near Rixdale. Our members enjoy 365 days of archery a year, with regular competition shoots at our NFAS field archery course. Some of our archers are national champions and leaders in their style, holding records and winning competitions across the country. We are a non-profit club, reinvesting all earnings back into the club to benefit members and renew equipment and targets. We welcome new members and visitors who must be full NFAS members to shoot at our club. To join, you can attend a beginners course or apply for provisional membership if already competent with a bow. As an NFAS member, you can arrange assessment by one of our coaches and then apply for full membership. Alternatively, you can pay the annual fee of £70 to become a member and shoot as a visitor for £5 per visit. Our local archery shop, Rixdale Archery Supplies, is located near us. We host three high-quality 3D archery events per year in the UK to promote competitive 3D archery. Our goal is to change perceptions of archers across the country and encourage more people to participate. We will start with the Welsh 3D Champs, a two-day event in July. Shooters must complete the competition within fifteen minutes before leaving the range to receive credit for that day's event. 1. The scorecard requires accurate information with all sections filled in correctly; any incorrect or incomplete blocks will result in a ten-point deduction from their total. 2. If the "12 Rings" section is left blank, it will be scored as zero. 3. Any changes to scores must be initialed by both the scorer and shooter, and no alterations can be made to the official scorecard after signing; if a shooter modifies their card after initial signature, they'll receive a score of zero for that tournament. Each group designates two scorekeepers who record all scores for their group and cannot maintain individual "official" coloured scorecards. Three scorers will be designated, with no one allowed to score their own arrow. In groups of four, the third scorer is alternated between scorekeepers or for the other scorekeeper's arrow. Scorers agree on a score for each arrow, calling out results to be recorded by Scorekeepers on respective shooter's scorecards (See Scoring Rule "C"). Scorekeepers maintain official coloured scorecards, recording totals and 12 Rings at round end. The completed card must be reviewed and signed as correct by the Scorekeeper and shooter. Scorekeepers turn in cards for their group together, except when a shooter is permitted to make-up targets due to equipment failure or other approved leave. Shooters assume full responsibility for accuracy of information on their cards; any group not turning in cards together before leaving will receive zero for that round. All arrows must remain in the target until scored; arrow shafts touching next highest scoring lines are scored accordingly. Scoring is done with naked eye, except for prescription glasses or contacts; doubtful arrows status is determined before drawing from the target. Targets may not be moved or dislodged for scoring purposes and shall be returned to upright position upon removal. The arrows must align in order to be scored. In case both Scorers can't agree on something, Scorekeepers (except when it's one of their own calls) will alternate scoring responsibility until all arrows are removed. Teams handle their own arrow calls. Three-Dimensional Arrow Range Officials only make calls during special tournaments or when there are two shooters left and a competition is ongoing. D. When an arrow passes through the front of a target, it gets pushed back in if that's what the team wants. If they agree that an arrow went through but was also partially inside the target, then that shooter can get points up to eight. If the group agrees that the arrow passed through due to lots of shots on it and that should be counted for a maximum ten point score. Rebounded or deflected arrows from another shot are allowed in if the team says yes. E. If an arrow is embedded inside another, it will get the same score as that one. If another arrow bounces back after hitting something but does not hit again before going into a target, then it gets the same points as the one that hit it first. G. Arrows that bounce off of other arrows and still go towards the target should get points equal to where they actually fall in that target or five if they don't even hit anything. H. The scoring for areas is 5, 8, 10, 12. I. There are targets with only one ring that score higher. Some have two but those can only be counted once per person. If a player chooses to go after the other ring, their teammates confirm and it's not scored anymore. J. Ties in classes that don't do Shoot Downs will break on how many extra rings people got. The shooters must follow special rules for tied places in Pro classes, which can be found in the "Pro Pressure Point Shoot Down" rules section. The following equipment is prohibited in all styles and classes: broadheads, mechanical hold mechanisms, laser sights, and devices that relieve bow weight from either arm while shooting. 3DAUK reserves the right to waive certain restrictions for physically challenged competitors under specific circumstances. By participating in this year's 3DA event at Avalon Archers, archers agree to abide by the revised rules and regulations. The event aims to create a safe environment, but each archer is responsible for their own actions and accepts all health risks during the Covid-19 pandemic. Archers must bring their own hand sanitizer, wipes, and disinfectant spray. Important notes: * No spectators or entourage are allowed. * Archers must notify 3DA of traveling companions by October 2nd. * Money shooters must declare their intention to compete in the Money Class by October 5th. * Arrive at least 45 minutes before designated Tee off time and complete ranges in the correct order. Participants are expected to maintain personal hygiene especially handwashing and clean their own arrows and equipment in between targets throughout the event. Each group has a time limit of 7 hours to complete the day's shooting. A completed scorecard must be submitted at the end of each session, accurately filled with details such as name, class, style, and total scores. There will be no prize distribution; awards will be posted or available for collection at the next event. Toilets will operate on a one-in-one-out basis, and attendees are advised to plan ahead. Catering services, smoking (except in designated areas), and dogs are not permitted. Participants must respect any signs, notices, and directions provided throughout the event. The parking area is located in the field, and limited camping facilities can be arranged via email by October 5th. Failure to abide by the rules may result in removal from the premises. It is essential for attendees to check the 3DA website for direction and updates on events.
