## Singapore traffic laws

Speed limits The speed limit indicates the maximum speed that motor vehicles are allowed to travel on the road. The document also enables the Land Transport Authority in Singapore which is the institution governing vehicle registration and road transportation regulations. Severe offences can lead to more than 12 points, fines, imprisonment, or licence disqualification.New Drivers: On probation for one year. They may also be offered composition fines. These zones have reduced speed limits of 30 to 40 km/h. Accumulating 13 or more points results in licence revocation. Non-Probationary Drivers: Face suspension if they accumulate 24 points in 24 months (12 weeks suspension) or 12 points in 12 months (24 weeks suspension). Good Behaviour Incentives: Points expunged after 12 months of offence-free driving; suspensions removed after 24 months.Penalties for Traffic OffencesComposition Fines: Various fines apply for different offences. Silver Zones are found in selected housing estates with a higher population of seniors, relatively higher accident rates involving seniors and in areas near amenities frequently visited by seniors. Failure to do so can result in fines and demerit points.Cyclist Zones: Respect cyclist lanes and be cautious around bicycles. The right lane is designated for overtaking. Seat Belts and Child RestraintsMandatory Seat Belts: All passengers must wear seat belts.Child Restraints: Children under 1.35m must use appropriate restraints, child seat is a must.Drinking and DrivingBAC Limit: The legal Blood Alcohol Concentration (BAC) limit is 80 mg/100 ml of blood. Violations can lead to 12 demerit points and court prosecution.Smoking in VehiclesSmoking is not allowed in vehicles with children under the age of 12 present. While the Land Transport Authority is in charge with providing the necessary facilities for road transportation in Singapore to develop in safe conditions, the Traffic Police is in charge with the enforcement of traffic regulations and education of car owners and pedestrians. The Singapore Road Traffic Act classifies motor vehicles as it follows: - motor tractors, - heavy motor cars, - motor cycles, - invalid carriages. Motorists who want to turn right must stop behind the STOP line and wait for green arrow to turn on before they can proceed. Provide supporting documents and a detailed explanation of your appeal. The Land Transport Authority has issued the following speed limits which apply to both private car owners, but also to Singapore companies involved in transportation activities: - cars and motorcycles are limited at 50 km/h on roads, 70-90 km/h on motorways and 50-80 km/h in tunnels, - the speed limit for buses is 50 km/h on roads, 60 km/h on expressways and 50-60 km/h in tunnels, - commercial vehicles are limited at 50 km/h on roads, 50-60 km/h on motorways and 50-70 km/h in tunnels.
