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Homemade dalmatian costume

This DIY Dalmatian Halloween costume is an easy Cricut project suitable for any age group! It's a great last-minute option for kids and can also be used for dress-up play. This tutorial demonstrates how to use the new smart materials iron-on vinyl with the Cricut Maker 3, but older machines and heat transfer vinyl can still be used. The author received the Cricut Maker 3 machine to review and supplies to assist in this project. If you don't have a Cricut machine or EasyPress, you can still make this costume by hand-cutting spots from iron-on vinyl and applying it with an iron. The author encourages users to start with beginner projects to become comfortable using their Cricut machine. This post contains affiliate links, and the author may earn a commission on qualifying purchases. This easy Halloween costume can work for babies, toddlers, older kids, and even adults! It's also simple enough to pull together last-minute. The idea came from the author's kids being obsessed with Paw Patrol's Marshall character or watching the new Cruella movie. This project would be a great base for a DIY Paw Patrol Marshall costume - just add a firefighter hat! Whether your kid wants to be a solo pup or you're planning a family costume theme, this Dalmatian costume is easy to make with the Cricut Maker 3 and its smart materials. Using a Dalmatian Design with Iron-On Vinyl and the Cricut Machine To create a Dalmatian costume design, start by preparing your shirt in Cricut Design Space. Create several circles to form the spots. Choose which ones to use by clicking on the eye icon next to each group until you only see the desired ones. Use the long group with smart vinyl or individual dots placed in various locations to cut out a 12x12 section of iron-on material loaded onto a mat, with the shiny side facing down. After cutting, peel back from the corner at a 45-degree angle and remove excess iron-on material from the liner. Cut the liner apart for easier placement on the shirt. The Cricut Heat Guide helps apply iron-on materials using the EasyPress 2. Select your base material and the temperature to set based on the guide's instructions, taking into account whether you're using an EasyPress Mat or a folded towel. To ensure accurate application, use sections of the shirt at a time, shifting it between each press. This process was repeated for the entire front side before flipping the shirt over and repeating on the back. Once all spots are applied and cooled, remove the liners from the iron-on material. Next, cut out ears using the Cricut machine and apply them to a headband by hot gluing. The ears can be placed flat or angled to flop forward. Given article text here I started with the upper right side of the shirt and then moved it over to press the EasyMat's upper left side in sections. Once the entire front was done, I removed the liners and flipped the shirt over. Repeating the process on the back, I then carefully peeled off the liners. After that, I loaded felt fabric into my Cricut to cut out the ears and attached them to a headband using glue. The final look is great with black leggings or pants. Without a Cricut cutting machine or EasyPress, you can still make this costume by hand-cutting spots from iron-on vinyl and applying it with an iron. Now it's mom's turn! Mom & Kids Easy 101 Dalmatian Costumes I realized after getting our puppy involved that we never did a DIY costume involving mom before. So now mom gets to be Cruella! As Cruella, she should make a more serious face. A group costume is fun and allows moms to share their love for this classic Disney film with kids. Coordinating matching outfits brings families closer through shared experiences and memorable moments. Gather your spotted crew and start the adventure - let those spots shine! I made dog ears from felt, glued them onto hats or headbands, and used sticky sheets for outfits. On Primary.com pajamas, I cut circles (3 sizes) and stuck them on. After Halloween, peel off the spots and reuse the PJs! Draw puppy nose & eye with eyeliner/face paint crayon. For DIY Kids Cruella Costume: White PJs, Sticker backing, Felt sheets, Headband or hat, Black eyeliner/face paint, Dog ears from felt, Circle cutouts from sticky felt sheets. We've got more costume ideas - Mickey Mouse, Mario & Luigi, Lion & Lion Tamer, Gumball Machine, Superhero || Winnie the Pooh, Mickey, Minnie, Goofy & Pluto, Rainbow, Cowgirl, Charlie Brown Curious George, Dolphin Trainer, K9 Unit Police Officer. To create a convincing Dalmatian costume, start by applying black felt spots to white clothing using fusible web for added durability. Vary spot size and shape for a natural look. Allow one side of each garment to dry completely before flipping it over and repeating the process on the other side. Don't forget the signature floppy ears, which can be made from white felt by painting black spots and attaching them to a headband. For a realistic touch, add pink inner ear pieces near the base of each ear. You can also create a Dalmatian tail by cutting a strip of white felt or fabric, tapering one end, and adding black spots. Finally, use black eyeliner to create a nose and consider adding spots to your face and hands for a complete look. Dress up as a Dalmatian like never before! Forget to bark, and let the adorable homemade costume do all the talking. This DIY project is perfect for kids of all ages and is sure to bring smiles wherever it goes. To make this spotty sensation, you'll need: white turtleneck or sweatshirt, circle-shaped sponge, white tube sock, 2 white ankle socks, black fabric paint, paper plate, needle, thread, stuffing, white headband, wide jewelry collar or ribbon, and a small paint brush. Start by painting the shirt, pants, and socks with black fabric paint. Use a sponge to create the iconic Dalmatian spots - just remember, this paint is permanent! Let one side dry before moving on to the other. Next, stuff the tube sock with filling, leaving about 2 inches at the top. Sew it shut, then attach the ankle socks to the headband to form the ears. Finally, sew the tube sock to the back of the pants, and add the name tag with the small paint brush. Voila! Your spotty Dalmatian costume is ready for trick-or-treating or any other fun occasion.
