You might think you are locked out of changing the camera's shutter speed in this mode, but that's not true: You can indirectly change shutter speed very easily by adjusting your ISO sensitivity. One main advantage of using bird hides is that the birds will not get disturbed. So, you may find it a little tough to carry. The main problem occurs in bright conditions: Your ISO could go so low that it hits the base value, and needs to go lower, but it can't. More often than not, we end up missing optimal settings in the camera. Follow this advice to best capture the elusive birds. In my opinion, these two are the best modes for photographing birds. (Even if you do keep your ISO sensitivity at the base value, this still prevents overexposure simply by using a faster shutter speed if your ISO dips to the base value.) Auto ISO SettingsEvery camera has a maximum acceptable ISO. Make sure to learn from your mistakes. There is a chance it will turn away from you. I intentionally avoided a few important topics like lens choice, as there are already endless debates and articles about them if you wish to partake. When you get closer to the birds in the image. Beyond that, issues like haze come into play, which affect the overall contrast and colors to a noticeable extent. Capture in RAW format I recommend capturing the bird image in RAW format instead of JPEG. The golden rays of soft diffused light from the Sun falling on the bird can help to create some wonderful frames. Don't Go for Frequent Gear Upgrades I strongly recommend not going for frequent camera gear upgrades. Capture Some Habitat Frames Do not always go for bird portraits with nice and clean backgrounds. Most of the time with bird photography, we are forced to shoot at higher ISOs. It literally means more noise. Especially, if you get your lens to the eyes perfectly at certain angles depending on the birds positioning from the light. From my experience, all birds will not allow you to approach them. So, it may fly away when you try to take a photograph. The background was a lot darker than the subject. Once they are comfortable, you can approach them slowly. For fast-moving birds, you need to use shutter speeds of 1/1600 and above. You don't want to crop your photo too much. Add that to autofocus accuracy concerns - the tracking system working best with more central AF points - and it can be a recipe for imperfect sharpness if you place your subject too far off-center. Of course, it's always a balance. And so on. Whatever the action may be, anticipate it and be persistent until it happens. But in many cases it makes it boring, as there is no activity going on. This is another reason why it is not a good idea hopping from one bird to another after bagging their profile picture. If you see two birds in close proximity there is a chance of a fight. So, be ready with the right camera settings for photographing birds. Crawling freaks out your subjects way less than walking at full height. The normal shutter noise can disturb the birds. Birds perch on trees, rocks, and ground. This is because, when it comes to bird photography, if we do not understand our subject's temperament we will end up with no subject at all. Of course, this holds true for any wildlife, but it means all the more when it comes to birds.
